SOSC 2780 Modernization and Social Change

Synopsis

This course is designed to acquaint students with the major concepts and theoretical perspectives of modernization and social change. It provides students with the essential knowledge about social, economic, and political development in an interdisciplinary manner that enables students to understand the divergent patterns of development in the world. Development experiences from both developing countries in the South and developed countries in the North will be used as examples to illustrate the merits and shortcomings of different theories in the field of modernization and social change.

This course is divided into three parts. Part I studies theories of modernization and dependency, including the demographic, psychological, political, economic, and cultural modernization theories; the classical colonialism theory and the new dependent development theory.

Part II examines the world-systems perspective and discusses how this perspective can help you understand the origins and transformation of the development project (1945 - 1970s) and the globalization project (1980s - the present). In particular, we will examine how the globalization project has led to such new phenomenon as de-industrialization and re-industrialization, the restructuring of nation-state, hybrid cultural identity, flexible employment, and the widening of social inequality in the 21st century. We will also examine how the civil society and social movements responded to the challenges of globalization.

Part III shifts the attention from development theories to the historical study of East Asia over the past two centuries. It will examine theories of the rise of East Asia, the historical trajectory of the East Asian region, as well as the issues related to socialist revolution and post-socialist transformation, the rise of Japan and China, and how the Chinese national reunification project has affected the development of the mainland, Taiwan, and Hong Kong since the 1980s.

After taken this course, students should be able to know what the concepts of "modernization" and "globalization" mean, be able to explain the divergent paths of development in the global South, as well as be able to understand the new challenges of globalization facing the advanced industrial countries in the North and the developing countries in the South in the 21st century.
